# Overview of activity in this year

Multi Agency Risk Assessment Conferences – met 13 times and discussed 113 high risk victims of domestic abuse with a total of 156 in the households.

safe and Together – 130 members of staff attended overview sessions and 50 out of a possible 100 staff undertook Core Training to support better responses to survivors of domestic abuse, supporting children to be safe, recover from trauma and have greater stability whilst intervening with perpetrators to recuse risk and harm to children

Held domestic abuse training sessions to staff from across agencies.

Held a **Bystander Event** to support people to understand how best to challenge sexism.

# Overview of activity in this year

Together,
Dumfriesshire &
Stewartry Women's
Aid, Wigtownshire
Women's Aid and
D&G Rape Crisis
received 941 referrals;
236 were self-referrals.



ASSIST (Advocacy Support Safety Information Services Together) started to work in our region to support victims of domestic abuse in the justice process.

Rape Crisis provided support and advocacy to victim/survivors of rape and sexual assault over the age of 12. Police Scotland continue to provide the Disclosure Scheme for Domestic Abuse Scotland (DSDAS). This is similar to Clare's Law in England where people in a new relationship (or their friends and family) have the right to ask if there is any information relating to their partner's domestic abuse history or agencies can ask for the power to tell when they are aware of a domestic abuse perpetrators' past.



The Mentors in Violence
Prevention programme
continued in schools to increase
awareness of gender-based
violence and supports pupils
to develop confidence and
leadership skills. This was in
11 of the 15 secondary schools
across Dumfries and Galloway.

Dumfries and Galloway Sexual Assault Reporting Centre (SARC) continued to offer forensic sampling to victims of sexual assault (including those who do not want to report this at the time).

# Overview of activity in this year

370 people took part in the VAWG Community Survey – 45% had experience of sexual harassment and 23% stalking. 59% of the participants indicated they had experienced domestic abuse in the past as well as rape and sexual assault. 80% acknowledged the impact of media on the sexualisation of young women.



#### Overview of activity in this year

Police Scotland continued to arrange and chair regular Multi Agency Tasking and Coordinating meetings (MATACs) where the focus is on domestic abuse perpetrators. There are links with MARAC where referral to MATAC is a common action. There has been agreement that information on MATAC will be brought to VAWG Sub Committee meetings giving us a fuller picture of issues and responses.

**Measuring impact:** 

**Data** – significant progress was made in data collection and analysis. This work remains ongoing but is already adding value.

We responded to **two national consultations** and attended additional national consultation meetings ensuring a local perspective was reflected.

16 Days of Activism for the Elimination of Violence Against Women is an international campaign that runs from 25 November (the International Day for the Elimination of VAW) until the 10th December (International Human Rights Day). As in previous years there was a local programme of events running alongside national events and public information with the messages #what next and #lightup.



# Challenges

- Delays in the justice system and court back logs led to significant trauma and challenges for survivors and the agencies supporting them.
- The cost of living crisis started to have increased impact on survivors of abuse and on all services.
- Short term funding continues to be a challenge for services.
- Agencies reported staff burnout and inflationary impact.
